Training scholarships

Would you like to help deaf children get the most from their time at school?

If you are a teacher who would like to become a Teacher of the Deaf (ToD), scholarships are available for your training. The Con Powell Memorial Scholarships are managed by the British Association of Teachers of the Deaf (BATOD), with support provided by the Ewing Foundation team. We are currently mentoring five scholars.

The scholarships are aimed at teachers whose local authority is not obliged to support them financially. They are funded by our partner Ovingdean Hall Foundation.

The 2019 Scholarships are open till 30th April 2019, and will reopen in January 2020.
