We are celebrating 70 amazing years of supporting deaf children and young people and their teachers.

Malcolm and Sheila McAlpine set up the **Ewing Foundation** in 1952, naming it in honour of the audiologists Sir **Alexander and Lady** Irene Ewing.

The Ewings had been of enormous help to the McAlpines when their son was born deaf in 1944, and Malcolm and Sheila wanted other deaf children and their families to benefit from the Ewings' expertise. The McAlpines' youngest son Hamish has been our Chair since 2011, although he has been attending Trustee meetings for 45 years!

We have come a long way since our early days, when our first Technology Consultant, George Dalziel, travelled the country by van, visiting schools with a Warren group hearing aid donated by the partially deaf singer Johnny Ray.

Since then, our fantastic team of specialists has checked and repaired thousands of hearing



aids and radio aids, and supported thousands of deaf children and young people and their teachers in the classroom. What makes our work special is its hands-on delivery, providing immediate, practical benefits for deaf children and young people and their teachers.

We have always had an eye to the future and, during the past two years, our service delivery team has grown. Mark has joined our Technology Consultants, supporting schools and services in the north of England. Our Con Powell Memorial Scholars, past and present, have reunited for a special afternoon tea to celebrate ten years of the Scholarships programme for trainee Teachers of the Deaf.

During the event in York, Scholars developed a giant timeline marking their progress over the last decade, noting the defining moments in their personal journeys and their careers. Four former Scholars shared their tips for getting the most out of the training and for moving into employment.

'The event provided a lovely opportunity to review the last ten years, better understand what the Scholarships meant to people and encourage them to continue to share progress and support one another going forward,' said Ewing Foundation Chief Executive Officer, Sarah Armstrong.

We hope that this gathering will be the first of many, and will encourage our alumni to 'give back' by sharing their learning with new Scholars and within the deaf education sector.

The Scholarships are named in honour of Con Powell, the first President of BATOD and the first Chief Executive of Ewing Foundation. Each year, our grantmaking partner Ovingdean Hall Foundation (OHF) offers up to five Scholarships for teachers to train to become Qualified Teachers of the Deaf (QToDs). The Scholarships are managed by BATOD, with Scholars receiving support from Ewing Foundation staff. Over the past decade, 45 people have completed the programme.

Con Powell's son Kevin sent a message on behalf of his family: 'We're delighted to know that so many people have benefited from the training bursaries over the years and that this helps in continuing the brilliant

work you collectively do. Teacher training was always something close to our father's heart, and it means a lot to us to know his contribution to deaf education is still being recognised. He would have been very proud, as we (and families) are, of this being enacted in his name.'

Thank you to all who attended – our Scholars, BATOD and Ewing colleagues, and to our Education Adviser Helen who organised this special day marking ten years of supporting the next generation of deaf education professionals.

Test rod development

Our Technology Consultant Paul Harris has been involved in developing an innovative new test rod to allow users to monitor their bone anchored hearing aids (BAHAs).



Over the past year, Paul has collaborated with audiology supplier Graham Bath to create the rod for use with a single test rod adaptation. It is compatible with both the Oticon Medical Ponto and Cochlear BAHAs.

Known colloquially as 'the glowstick', orders for the first batch of the Bath and Harris Test Rod (BHTR) can be placed with Rubi Audiology (www.rubiaudiology.com). Many sensory teams can also buy a BHTR directly from us by adding it to their Ewing Foundation account.

'There are many advantages to using our BHTR,' says Paul.
'It is affordable, easy to hold, easy to clean, and, because of its additional length, can be positioned close to the ear canal for better clarity and reduced acoustic feedback.' He also notes that the BHTR's bright colour makes it difficult to lose!

The first batch of BHTR retail at £38.90 each. We are delighted that £1 from the sale of every BHTR will be donated to the Ewing Foundation.
