
Hearing to Succeed and Achieve


Our Education Advisor Katy Mitchell has produced a helpful and practical guide for families and early year practitioners to support young children with a hearing loss.

Hearing to Succeed and Achieve provides clear information on why so many young children have a hearing loss and the impact this has on their ability to listen to speech. The guide explores possible interventions and offers simple steps and tips, so that a young child with a hearing loss can succeed in developing speech and language and achieve their potential.

Hearing to Succeed and Achieve includes information about otitis media with effusion (commonly known as glue ear), and the launch of the document coincided with the release of updated guidance from the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) on the condition. Hearing to Succeed and Achieve is one of the resources signposted by NICE in their guidance, which was released at the end of August 2023 (www.nice.org.uk/guidance/ng233).

Hearing to Succeed and Achieve also looks at other sources of information about glue ear. These include Glue Ear Together (www.glueeartogether.org.uk), a parent-led organisation, supported by Ewing Foundation's grant making partner Ovingdean Hall Foundation.

Bringing theatre to life



Our Education Advisors Clare Prior and Helen Martin have been involved in a project supported by our partner charity Ovingdean Hall Foundation (OHF) to make theatre more accessible for deaf children and young people.

Over the last year, Pilot, a national touring company, has delivered eight workshops to 99 deaf learners at four schools/settings in the Midlands and North of England. The workshops preceded and followed the young people's visit to a performance of either *Noughts and Crosses* or *Run, Rebel*.

Clare and Helen supported the project by facilitating contact with groups of deaf learners. They also advised

on making the theatre experience more inclusive. OHF are supporting Pilot as they continue their work with deaf young people in 2024.

Supporting scholars

After they complete their studies, Scholars are welcomed into our alumni group, and given the opportunity to get involved in a way that works for them. For example, some have shared their learning with new recipients, or delivered presentations at conferences.

This is a great way for Qualified Teachers of Deaf Children and Young People to give back through providing support for the profession, while also building their own experience and CV along the way,' said our Education Advisor, Helen.
